### Administrative Procedure - Cheerleader Guidelines - Wayne City High School

1. Cheerleaders will be elected in the spring of the year.
2. The method of selection of the cheerleaders will be in a tryout competition, judged by a team of at least three (3) adults chosen jointly by the cheerleading sponsor and the administration. The judges should be preferably from out of district.  
The procedure of tallying the ballots will be as follows: There will be at least three (3) judging ballots for each participant. Selection of the squad will be based on the combined total score of the judges for each participant. The girls with the highest scores, up to a maximum of 15 cheerleaders, will be selected for the squad.
3. There will be a maximum of fifteen (15) cheerleaders and no alternates throughout the year. For example, if only eleven (11) cheerleaders tryout, there will only be eleven (11) cheerleaders.
4. Cheerleaders may attend cheerleading camps as individuals without the sponsor attending. The sponsor or designee assigned by the administration must attend all camps in which the squad is approved to attend. Field trip guidelines will apply to such trips. Cheerleaders will be expected to pay their own camp fees.
5. All cheers to be performed must be in writing and must be approved by both the sponsor and the Principal prior to public performance.
6. It is understood that the Athletic Fund will furnish each cheerleader a uniform consisting of a sweater or vest, skirt, and emblem, however, cheerleaders are responsible for tights, shoes, and socks. Cheerleaders are not allowed to purchase "extras" for their uniforms.
7. Uniform selection shall be left at the discretion of the cheerleading sponsor and Principal with the following stipulations:
  - (1) Cheerleading uniforms (skirts, sweaters/vests) will be purchased on a "needs" basis rather than receiving new ones each year.
  - (2) Junior varsity and varsity cheerleading uniforms are to be identical in all respects. (No seniority bars are to be purchased for jr. high)
8. Participating cheerleaders must have the following on file:
  - (1) a current physical examination
  - (2) written parental consent
  - (3) proof of insurance
9. Cheerleaders may not practice in school facilities without the sponsor or assigned personnel supervising such practices.
10. Sponsors must attend all practices and attend all ballgames in which the cheerleaders cheer unless the Principal specifically assigns a school employee as the sponsor for the event in question.
11. Cheerleaders may have two (2) fundraisers per year to help purchase items not covered by the athletic fund.
12. In all instances where a policy for cheerleading is not covered herein, the Principal shall make the final decision.
13. Cheerleaders are to obey the rules as outlined in the "Wayne City Community Unit School District No. 100 Extracurricular Activity Code," Administrative Procedure 7:240-R2.

## MOTOR VEHICLE RECORD EVALUATION

It is the policy of **Wayne City CUSD #100** that MVRs (Motor Vehicle Reports) should be obtained on all drivers on an annual basis and also used as the foundation for selecting employees who will be allowed to operate a company vehicle.

The review of these reports is important when hiring a new driver, as their past driving record affords one of the best clues to his/her future performance as a safe, dependable driver. Past experience has shown there is a high correlation between poor driving records and accident frequency. A new employee should not be allowed to drive a company vehicle until his MVR is obtained and favorable results are noted. Annual review of the MVR should result in the determination of whether an employee can continue to drive a company vehicle. One system of review follows:

**ALL TYPE A VIOLATIONS (as defined below) WILL RESULT IN TERMINATION OF DRIVING PRIVILEGES FOR EMPLOYEES AND WILL DISQUALIFY ANY POTENTIAL DRIVER EMPLOYEES.**

**ANY DRIVERS (EMPLOYEES OR APPLICANTS) SHOWING ONE OF THE FOLLOWING WILL BE RESTRICTED FROM DRIVING COMPANY VEHICLES:**

- One (1) or more type A Violations in the last 3 years
- Three (3) or more accidents (regardless of fault) in the last 3 years.
- Three (3) or more type B violations in the last 3 years
- Any combination of accidents and type B violations which equal Four (4) or more in the last 3 years.

### Type A Violations:

- Driving While Intoxicated
- Driving While Under the Influence of Drugs
- Negligent Homicide Arising out of the use of a Motor Vehicle (gross negligence)
- Operating During a period of Suspension or Revocation
- Using a Motor Vehicle for the commission of a Felony
- Aggravated Assault with a Motor Vehicle
- Operating a Motor Vehicle Without the Owners Authority (grand theft)
- Permitting an Unlicensed Person to Drive
- Reckless Driving
- Speed Contest (racing)
- Hit and Run (Bodily Injury or Property Damage)

### Type B Violations

- All Moving Violations not listed as type 'A' Violations
